Ralph will give us a history of the park, which is the oldest park in the city of Miami and preserves a portion of the Brickell Hammock that once extended from the Miami River to Coconut Grove. Mr. Beaudry will also talk about the Big Cypress Preserve which will be followed up by a field trip to the Big Cypress later this year.

The site seems to contain a large ceremonial component with entire animal skeletons and whole antlers found buried with humans. A tremendous amount of alligator coprolites was also discovered interred in the burial area suggesting the possibility of an alligator cult. A very thick skulled individual puzzled Gypsy and her crew. A giant, dwarf or Black were three possible alternatives suggested by the analysis. A pre-Columbian Black would be unique.

Tropical sunset complimenting the Industrial Art that adorns them. Brightly painted lines rounding corners. Neon lighted windows in the darkness.


A few old buildings have elegant gilded stairways thru their lobbies. As new ones seem to want to climb into the heavens.

ARCHAEOLOGICAL PARK OPENED

South Florida's first Archaeological Park was opened on December 9, 1987. The 8.9 acre park was donated by Arvida corporation to the Broward County Parks Department and is situated within the Weston development in west Broward. Arvida contracted the Archaeological and Historical Conservancy to develop a preservation plan for the site. The result is a preserved Tequesta midden interpreted with a 5 meter excavation cut away. The park also includes a reconstructed Seminole village. The park is open during daylight hours seven days a week and is located one mile south of State Road 84, near the intersection of Weston Blvd. and Indian Trace Rd.
